Curriculum implementation

Our approach to curriculum delivery

Due to the size of the school we are readily able to identify support and respond to individual students learning within the school context. We have the ability to develop close relationships with students and their families to provide an effective learning environment. Our school uses the C2C and Australian Standards to deliver a comprehensive and inclusive curriculum

How information and communication technologies are used to assist learning

At Walkamin State School we use computers to assist our learning through research (e.g. internet), skills reinforcement (e.g. Mathletics, Reading Eggs, RAZ Kids and scratch), teaching (e.g. electronic whiteboards), manipulating and collecting information (e.g. Access) as well as presenting information (e.g. PowerPoint). Computer skills, knowledge and usage are developed within the learning units – students learn about computers through using computers. Students have regular access to 24 desk tops and 12 laptops (with data projector) for usage in class. We are developing a bank of laptops to allow us flexibility in usage around the school. We have a set of 12 IPads which are Wi-Fi enabled and can be used for educational purposes anywhere in the school. 4 electronic whiteboards, one in each classroom, are used to enhance learning through electronic presentation and manipulation of materials.

Social climate

Overview

Our students are involved in a school based values p to develop social and academic skills and attitudes to enhance their learning. We regularly refer to our school based values when dealing with students (i.e. on parade, in-class, newsletter, noticeboard). In 2019 Walkamin State School applied for and received funding to supply a chaplain 3 days a fortnight. The Chaplain works with a range of students in a variety of support programs.

Parent and community engagement

Walkamin State School issues report cards with parent teacher interviews two times a year, at the end of each semester.

Parents are regularly invited to curriculum days, arts and craft days, excursions and sporting events such as our Cross country and inter-house sports day, Easter parade and performance night. Parents are encouraged to involve themselves in our P&C committee which meets the second Tuesday of each month in the Library at 3.00pm. Our P&C regularly runs fundraising and social events as well as working bees to improve the facilities and resources of the school. Due to the smallness of the school parents have an added advantage in their involvement in their child's education in the classroom.

Respectful relationships education programs

Our school has implemented the Respectful relationships education program (RREP) as part of the broad multidepartmental Queensland Government approach to ending domestic and family violence.

The RREP is a Prep to Year 12 prevention program that focuses on influencing behavioural change to build a culture based on equality and respect in our students, staff, parents and wider community, Students are provided opportunities to explore social and emotional learning in self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationships, ethics, values, social norms, gender roles, stereotypes, human rights, risk and responsible decision-making. A growing body of evidence shows that social and emotional learning of this nature leads to:

- · improved social and emotional skills, self-concept, bonding to school and classroom behaviour
- less disruptive classroom behaviour, aggression, bullying and delinquent acts
- reduced emotional distress such as depression, stress or social withdrawal.

Environmental education has been a feature of Queensland schools for more than 30 years. In many schools it has been creatively and proactively incorporated into the curriculum in each phase of learning, and is also reflected in the school's facilities and in the actions of its principals, teachers and students.

Walkamin State School is an Earth smart School. We have undertaken a number of initiatives to reduce our environmental footprint including; collecting food scraps to feed to our chooks; creating and maintaining a permaculture garden; sorting of rubbish into recyclables to reduce land fill; solar panels that feed back into the grid

- (b) a one-year graduate initial teacher education program following a degree (e.g. a one-year Graduate Diploma of Education (Secondary) after a three-year Bachelor degree) or
- (c) another course of teacher education that the QCT is reasonably satisfied is the equivalent of (a) or (b). These are considered on a case-by-case basis.

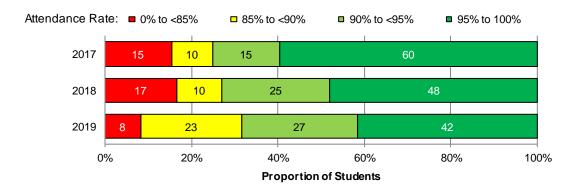
